Welcome back to TCU Lonsdale Elementary for the second half of the year!

The end of our second quarter is fast approaching. We have had a great first semester and we look forward to the rest of the year. A new year always gives us the opportunity to reflect upon what we have done well and what we can do better. Have you been trying to figure out a new year's resolution? If the answer to the question is yes, I have a great suggestion for you. How about setting plans to help your children experience greater school success in 2017? Here are some ideas to be sure your child is successful at school:

- 1. Monitor your student's school work. One way to do this is to have them check in with you after school and share how their day went. A good opening question to help them communicate about this is to ask, "What did you learn in school today?" If you get a vague answer, follow-up by asking them about specific subjects such as: math, reading, or science. Another important way to monitor their work is to have them share any corrected school papers they brought home and discuss them together. You can further monitor by checking on their homework. While parents should never do homework for their young people, it is sound practice to help them if they are struggling, check it over for them once they are finished.
- 2. Make sure your children get to school. The more students are in school, the higher their achievement. Children cannot learn if they are not in school. In addition, poor attendance causes students to get behind in their learning and catching up can be very difficult when they return. In fact, poor attendance is often the first step to students being unsuccessful at school. Please have them to school on-time. Even if they are just 10 minutes late it can impact their day. Students are involved in learning experiences as soon as they enter our doors. Our school doors open at 8:45 with a start time of 8:50. Students will be marked tardy after 9:00.
- 3. Reward their efforts. Rewarding students for high grades is not as effective as rewarding them for their effort and growth. Students are always trying and want to make you proud. Therefore, the best way to motivate further effort is to notice it, to praise it, and to reward it.
- 4. Talk up the idea of going to college. I know your students are only in elementary school, but this should start at a very young age. As a staff we are always talking about where we went to school and how we benefitted from college. Having students set higher education as a target early in their lives will help them set ambitious goals for their academic progress as they proceed through school.
- 5. Finally, be involved! How important is parent involvement in their children's education? Study after study shows that it may be the top factor leading to student success. Whether it's taking time after school to ask questions about your child's day or volunteering in your child's classroom, if you have education as a priority it will be apparent to your child the expectations that are set for them. High expectations lead to high effort and achievement.




Technology News:

Lonsdale Youth Recycling Green Team Program



Lonsdale has curbside pickup for newspapers, corrugated cardboard and other paper products. These items can be recycled, but not everyone takes the time to do this. As a result, quite a bit of recyclable paper is being sent to the trash disposal facility. The Youth Recycling Project is designed to get youth groups involved in promoting cardboard and mixed paper recycling in Lonsdale. Newspapers, corrugated cardboard and other paper products will continue to be recycled through the curbside program. Youth groups will help promote the use of collection boxes located at IGA Foods 750 Ash St N., Lonsdale MN that will provide a more convenient location for people to drop off a variety of recyclable goods.

What's In It For Your Youth Group?

As a reward for helping to promote cardboard and mixed paper recycling in Lonsdale, your group will receive \$15/ton for all the paper and cardboard collected while you are charge of the program.

PAPER RECYCLING FACTS

For every ton of paper recycled, the following resources are saved:

17 trees

4100 KWH of electricity

9 barrels (380 gallons) of oil

54 million BTU's of energy

3.3 cubic yards of landfill space

60 pounds of air pollutants

7,000 gallons of water

Every year each person in the United States used paper equivalent to 2 pine trees.

Nurse Update

Due to the increasing amount of students that are getting sick I'd like to let everyone know what has been going around the school and making kids ill.

I did send home a letter before Christmas break but I also wanted to include this information on the News letter because we were hoping this sickness would not return to school after break but it is still here!

A 24 hour bug has been spreading throughout the school. This bug comes with no warning signs. No fever or cold/flu symptoms have been present. Kids will feel it coming on for about 10-15 minutes prior and then they will vomit. Afterwards, they have been feeling okay and back to their normal selves. However, school policy states that if a child vomits at school they cannot return to school until it has been 24 hours since the last known incident of becoming ill. For example, if a student gets ill at 10:30AM Tuesday they may not return to school until 10:30AM Wednesday.
